The mission of the USC Rossier Center on Education Policy, Equity and Governance (CEPEG) is to conduct rigorous, practice-relevant research that advances educational equity for California K-12 students – with an emphasis on greater Los Angeles – and to create partnerships that ensure education policies, practices and governance structures are guided by evidence and careful analysis.

We recognize that stakeholders' definitions of equity vary, both among CEPEG affiliates and in the education field more broadly. Our equity work at CEPEG is united by goals of addressing unjust social stratification and challenging oppressive educational beliefs, practices and structures to advance academic achievement and social-emotional development across social groups (for example by race/ ethnicity, gender and social class).

» CONDUCT RESEARCH WITH CONSEQUENCE

CEPEG works with a wide variety of partners to investigate pressing problems and to evaluate the effectiveness of policies and practices. Center faculty work closely with the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), the CORE Districts and Sacramento policymakers, in part through their close affiliation with Policy Analysis for California Education (PACE). Faculty conduct mixed methods research, leading to more relevant and rigorous analysis.

» MAKE RESEARCH ACCESSIBLE TO POLICYMAKERS, PRACTITIONERS AND ORGANIZATIONS

In order for true progress to be made, all stakeholders need timely access to relevant data and analysis. By leveraging technology and organizing public forums, we build new intellectual and political pathways for good research to lead to better policy.

CEPEG taps into Rossier's alumni base, especially USC's large network of superintendents, to identify, respond to and help solve problems of practice.

Through our strong presence as a training ground for California education leaders and researchers, we leverage center findings to train the next generation of practitioners and scholars committed to advancing equity through evidence-based policy.
